News in our Neighborhoods

Dayton's Crime Prevention Unit is on the move...

The first full week of May will find one area without the RPD's Crime Prevention Unit as another will benefit from the 24/7 service it provides to the neighborhood.

Community residents from Dayton, Fairbanks, Bauman, Ave D and Hoff Streets, (that are in the immediate area) benefitted from the use of this vehicle to help improve the quality of life for them. But now it is gone and it is up to the community to continue using the RPD resource, but more importantly help us to organize.

Two areas that we are working on is creating a block club for that area and converting Dayton Street into a one way traveling west from Hudson Ave., to Baumann Street. We were very successful at a Community Cook Out where 26 local residents expressed interest in participating in making our neighborhoods better living areas for them and their neighbors.

Christ Divine Assembly Church, pastored by the Rev. Arthur Kerr located at 919 Hudson Avenue has been very instrumental in allowing the neighborhood to use his facilities to facilitate the process. Also we tip our hats to the Rochester Police Department, Pathways to Peace, TIPS, Slater's Raiders and all others who made the transformation happen.

We had several uplifts through our Neighborhood Service Center and the help of the PACTAC group of volunteers that help us make our street safe.

We are scheduling a Dayton St. Neighborhood Festival for Saturday, June 13, 2009 at Christ Divine and an adjacent empty lot on Dayton to continue to foster relationships between residents, law enforcement and local government.

The Crime Prevention Unit will be moved to Conkey Ave. at the base of Ave B to serve that neighborhood.

Remember together we can make a difference. □

City on the move to improve Portland Ave Corridor...

A while ago back a group from St. Vincent's DePaul group with the collaboration of St. Andrews Church met with Mayor Duffy and local residents to start the process to achieve a corridor study to improve the commercial strip, not to mention the quality of life in that area, spearheaded by Mr. Peter Schaad.

Recently the City of Rochester has allocated resources to commence a corridor study to identify the current status of the avenue with the objective to create a needs' assessment of the area through a visioning session. Mr. Matthew Ingalls of Ingalls Planning & Design has chosen to start the process.

It is important that all the interested parties give their input to assure that the immediate "feasible" community needs are .

Mayor Duffy will be walking the Ave on Wednesday May 26, 2009 from 5:30-7 PM starting at St. Andrews Church and traveling north on the west side of Portland.

Using the above mentioned walk as a catalyst for change, there will be a visioning session to be held at St. Andrews School on Saturday, May 30, 2009 from 8:30 AM to 12 noon. We cannot express more the need of neighborhood residents and business owners participating in what lies for the future to improve the quality of life in this area.

Way Back When: A Story of Group 14621's Remarkable Past

Last time I outlined the very beginnings of Group 14621 – the first issue (zoning) that brought us together, and how we came to be known as Group 14621. For this column, I'd like to tell about how we changed from a floundering, ragtag bunch of concerned citizens to the real organization.

The first "president" (I think he was elected because nobody else wanted the job) of Group 14621 was Jack Skvorak. An organizer for the group MetroAct, he had an activist's view of how our neighborhood had been short-changed through the years. It was clear that volunteers could not shoulder the load of all that needed to be done. A couple of church-funded grants supported a couple of staff to get this started, but it was not until Bob Wendelgass was hired that things began to happen.

Wendelgass was young, bright, and committed to making the City a better place to live and work. His major talent, though, was in the ability to bring people together. He respected the elderly ladies on the first steering committee who couldn't get a grasp on the issues, as well as those who had some of the skills to move things forward. He believed in the power of block club organizing and the need for the organization to facilitate, but not do, the jobs that needed to be done – ultimately, the residents needed to speak up for themselves. His motto was "if we can't find volunteers to do it, then it can't be done".

It was realized, early on, that the steering committee lacked training in the basics of community organization. We tapped into an organized a week-end training conference outside of Albany, where steering committee members were trained on the power of block club organizing, communication with police departments, and other such rudiments of vital community organizations. Locally, Bob got a Monroe Community College professor to train each of us in leadership skills.

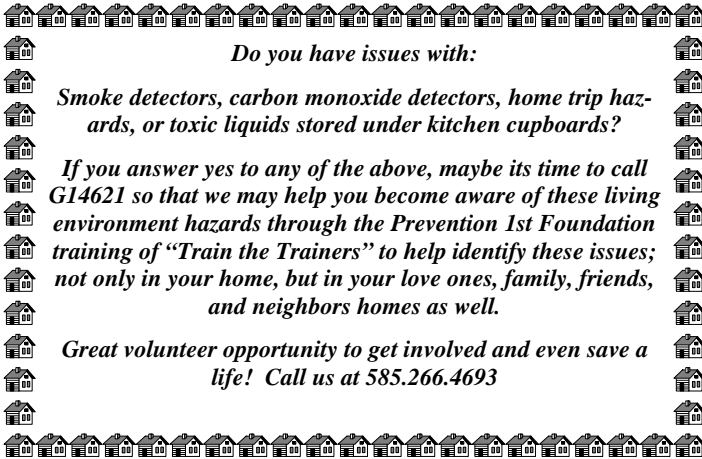
Bob also guided us toward grants that would fund the organization. We started out with grants that barely covered (and sometime didn't) his meager salary. Steering committee members decided to hold meetings over home cooked meals in their houses, to "subsidize" his salary. But, after a while, after tapping into VISTA, City of Rochester grants, the Campaign for Human Development and United Way, we were finally able to concentrate more on what we did than to how we funded it.

All along the way Bob managed to have us focus on the issues of the day. He spearheaded a survey of the neighborhood, and found that Housing, Safety, and Youth were the three burning issues. (My next columns will outline each of these.)

What I would like you to come away with from this column is that the choice of staff matters. Bob was an activist, but he was also a listener. He allowed people to tell their own story instead of telling it for them. We owe Bob Wendelgass a tribute as one who helped build the foundations of Group 14621 through his belief in the power of organizing the people in our neighborhood.

You may be wondering where Bob is now. He is working in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, for a national organization called Clean Water Action that helps local communities organize to stop pollution and that lobbies for strong laws to protect our environment and public health. We still keep in touch, and sometimes reminisce about "way back when" in Group 14621.

Group 14621 has a remarkable past. Stay tuned for other occasional stories from Group 14621's early history.

Firehouse Get Multi-Million Dollar Makeover

A 104-year-old Rochester firehouse

has a multi-million dollar extreme makeover on the way. Firefighters at Engine 16 on Hudson Avenue will have a new home for the next year and a half while the work gets done. When the alarm sounds, firefighters at Engine 16 on Hudson Avenue respond immediately.



"In 2008, we did just over 3,880 runs and that was an increase from the last year," Engine 16 House Captain Chris McCullough said. The 24/7, 365 day operation took its toll on this building. "This is an older fire house, the oldest active fire house still in the city," Rochester Fire Department Executive Deputy Chief Sam Mitrano said. It will soon become the newest one after its \$4 million renovation. "The guys are getting ready to start packing up here by the end of this month, the end of April, everyone will

be moved out," Mitrano said. "Through the renovation we're going to lose some of the historic value but we've also tried to keep as many of the details as possible," McCullough said. Like the arches that were once horse stables and the large door frames in the front of the building. The renovation will add an entire building that will take up the rest of the block to St. Jacob Street. Firefighters will also be able to use the second story of the existing building nearly tripling their usage space. Engine 16 firefighters often work calls from right across the street. The group moves in with the Clinton Avenue station for the time being. "They will be maintaining 95 percent of their original district for runs. So these people will see the same company they've always seen," Mitrano said. "It's kind of like moving out of home and moving into somebody else's home. So we've had to sit down and work out some ground rules and reorganize everything to fit in with the guys over there," McCullough said. It's an adjustment period that will take 18 months. The renovation money comes from the city's capital improvement plan. However the fire department hopes it can be part of the state's stimulus package because it's considered a "shovel ready" project.
